

School Uniform

Please can we remind all parents of the school uniform policy. The uniform policy is at the end of this newsletter. Please can we remind you that children are <u>not allowed to wear boots or</u> trainers as these items are not part of the school uniform. <u>Shoes must be smart and plain black</u>. Shoes should be <u>leather or equivalent</u>. Hair which is longer than shoulder length is expected to be tied up, for hygiene reasons. Socks should be <u>plain grey or black</u>. If any child comes to school wearing the incorrect uniform, parents will be contacted that morning to bring their child's correct uniform or footwear into school. We are very proud of our school and the smartness of our pupils.



Volunteer Helpers

If any parents would like to volunteer in the school please see Mrs Wicks in the school office to complete the required paperwork.

We welcome volunteers to help with readers, forest school, swimming and some school trips.

ParentPay

If any parents would like to pay for their school dinners by ParentPay, please see Mrs Wicks in the school office who can issue you with a username and password.

Also, please see Mrs Wicks if any parent who already use ParentPay has forgotten their details and wish to pay for their child's dinner electronically.

The cook also accepts payments by cash or by cheque payable to Chartwells.

Cheques can only be written out on a weekly basis.

From the start of this term, the cost of a school dinner is £2.10.

School Dinners:

As you are aware, the Government provide free school meals to all Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 children. Some children are eligible for Free School Meals throughout their school life and it is important to apply as soon as your child starts school, or if your circumstances change, as the school receives valuable extra funding that enhances the learning opportunities provided to make sure that your child gets the best start in their school life. You are eligible to apply if you are in receipt of one of the following benefits:



- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseekers Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Child Tax Credit (provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- During the initial roll out of the benefit, Universal Credit

If you are entitled to Working Tax Credit you are not entitled to free meals.

Key Stage 2 children are still required to pay for their school meal. Please can your child/children bring in their dinner money on the days that they are having dinner. Please can the money be brought into school in a named purse or wallet. If you wish to pay by cheque, please make this payable to Compass.

Parent Pay is available if you wish to pay electronically. If any parents need their login details, please see Mrs Wicks in the school office.

Scooters and Bikes:



Please remember that scooters, bikes and skateboards should not be used on school premises. This is for the safety of the children.



Water Bottles:



Remember to bring your water bottles into school daily and clearly labelled with your child's name.

Independence:

Now that the children have found their new pegs and settled into their classes, please encourage them to be independent and come into school on their own.

School Uniform Requirements:

Hair Bands:

Standard elastic hairbands can be any colour. Scrunchies and Alice bands need to be red, white or black.

School Jumpers:

Sew-on logos can be purchased at a cost of £4.00. We do expect all school jumpers to have the logo on the front.

Reminder:

We would like to remind you that our School Uniform Policy states that no necklaces, bracelets or wrist bands should be worn in school and only stud earrings are permitted. This is to ensure the continued safety for all children in the school. Any of these items could get caught or pulled during PE or playtimes and cause injury. If a child does come to school with these items, they will be looked after by the class teacher until the end of the day.

PE Kits:



Please can we remind you that all children require their PE Kits in school every week. PE t-shirts must be white and we would prefer them to have the school logo on the front. No jewellery can be worn during PE lessons and earrings should be removed or covered with plasters to avoid injury.

Animals:

Please can we remind all parents that NO animals are allowed inside the school gates.

GROWTH MINDSET



This academic year, we will be learning all about how our brains work and how learning occurs through the electrical connections in our brains. We will be finding out how the

learning powers of resilience, curiosity and making connections in learning can help us to build and strengthen our knowledge and understanding of all different areas. We will be learning about how the language we use can help us to change from a 'fixed mindset' to a 'growth mindset'.

In assembly next week, we will learn that we have to imagine ourselves as bouncy balls and if we find something tricky, we shouldn't give up but should bounce back, just like the ball!

East Hoathly CE Primary School Uniform Policy

Wearing school uniform is important in maintaining high standards and a sense of pride and belonging to the school. There is a formal school uniform, to which children are expected to adhere, and the co-operation of parents in maintaining the standard of dress is expected. Items not available in school can be purchased at any chain/department store, providing they meet the school's requirements. We reserve the right to forbid items of clothing, accessories and footwear that are not on the School Uniform list, or are unacceptably dangerous in School or against the interests of the children at large. Only wrist watches and studs are permitted and hair longer than shoulder length should be tied back. 'Extreme haircuts' and washable transfers or tattoos are also not permitted.

Details of the uniform are as follows, please make sure all items of clothing are clearly marked with your child's name – including shoes.

Compulsory uniform items available from school:

Red sweatshirt (with school logo), white PE T-shirt (with logo) and red PE shorts.

Non-compulsory items available from school:

Polo shirt with logo, school tie (optional), red fleece lined jacket, red fleece, book carrier, PE bag, summer hats.

Winter uniform is usually worn from the end of September to the beginning of April.

Summer uniform is usually worn from the end of April to the beginning of September.

For formal occasions e.g. church services we want our children to look smart, so please ensure they have a long-sleeved white shirt to wear with their school tie.

Pupils:

Winter

School sweatshirt/cardigan/jumper, polo shirt with logo, grey trousers, shorts or grey skirt/grey pinafore dress (must be knee length), white shirt, school tie (optional), grey, black, white or red socks and black school shoes.

Summer

School sweatshirt/cardigan, polo shirt with logo, short sleeve white shirt, grey trousers, shorts or red and white striped (or checked) dress, grey or black socks, and black school shoes or sandals that cover the child's toes.

Hairbands - should be plain. Scrunchies or ribbons should be white or red (non-decorative).

Partnership British Values Statement



It is our, and every school's responsibility "to promote the fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs."

At East Hoathly and Chiddingly we promote these values in the following ways:

Democracy:

At the beginning of each year children affirm the school's expectations and the rights and responsibilities associated with these. Every child and staff member abides by these. The children and staff actively engage with each other to create harmonious learning environments where everyone is responsible for the rules.

Both schools have a School Council to which members are voted in each year by their peers. Children write a statement to support their proposal to be their class representative and the children decide who will best represent them. Children understand that a place on the School Council comes with the responsibility of representing their peers' needs and interests.

We encourage children to be leaders throughout the school and we have a number of activities and responsibilities that are undertaken by the children. For example, pupils from Key Stage 2 are peer mediators and play leaders at lunch and play times. They have specific timeslots during which they are on duty and are responsible for encouraging all children to take part at playtime, for example by inviting them into games.

Democracy is taught during assemblies and during class-based PSHE sessions. Children regularly get opportunities to express their views in school through Pupil Voice interviews and questionnaires.

The Rule of Law

Behaviour and safety at East Hoathly and Chiddingy are seen as an absolute priority by the entire school community. Children know what is expected of them, why rules are so important, and what the consequences are if they do not follow them. Children at East Hoathly and Chiddingly are well aware of what an exciting curriculum they have and their sustained excellent behaviour enables them to develop into confident and independent learners.

At East Hoathly and Chiddingly we ensure that children are acutely aware of the responsibilities that come with having rights. Children develop a thorough understanding of personal responsibility and develop independence in managing relationships and behaviour. Through our whole school approach to restorative justice, we enable children to develop the language and strategies to solve conflict and right wrongs.

At East Hoathly and Chiddingly we offer a range of exciting opportunities for children to be leaders throughout the school, and they understand that the rules they have created for their classes permeate through all activities and events. Children also understand that their behaviour and regard for the rules extends beyond the school itself, such as acting as school ambassadors while on school trips. This understanding means that teachers can organise fascinating school trips secure in the knowledge that children will get the same from them as they do from learning opportunities within school.

Individual Liberty

East Hoathly and Chiddingly are safe places for children and both cultivate an atmosphere in which children can make choices about their school life in a supportive environment.

We educate our pupils to know that they have boundaries within which they may make choices safely, through the provision of a nurturing mindset and empowering education. Pupils are encouraged to know, understand, and exercise their rights and personal freedoms and are advised on how to exercise these safely, for example through our E-Safety and PSHE lessons. Whether it is through choice of challenge, of how they record, or of participation in our numerous extra-curricular clubs and opportunities, pupils are given the freedom to make choices. From the very start of their school life children are encouraged to challenge their personal best by giving them ownership of their own learning. Children regularly have next steps shared with them, whether verbally or with written feedback in books so they know exactly what they can do to progress.

Mutual Respect

The ethos of our schools nurture an understanding of mutual respect and it underpins the engaging and exciting teaching and learning that happens here. School life at East Hoathly and Chiddingly abides by our values that nurture kindness, resilience, honesty and respect. The children and all staff connected to our school understand our values and work in a manner that encourages everyone to achieve to their highest ability. Assemblies regularly cover 'Respect', and pupils have been part of discussions related to what this means and how we show it. When a child does well, their achievement is displayed for everyone to learn from their positive attitude and hard work. Learning and effort are highly respected.

Tolerance of those of Different Faiths and Beliefs

This is achieved through enhancing pupils' understanding of their place in a culturally diverse society and by giving them opportunities to experience such diversity. We celebrate and learn about the numerous religious festivals that happen throughout the school year. Children experience influences from all over the world in their classrooms. Our core values ensure children develop respect for the person; developing strong and lasting relationships that enable the community to be strong and cohesive.

Parent Code of Conduct

A Code of Conduct for Parents, Carers and Visitors

Rational

The Pioneer Federation has welcoming, supportive and inclusive schools and it is important that all members of the school community work together. We depend on the entire school community to help us maintain and improve our children's learning.

We are very fortunate to have supportive and friendly parents and carers. Our parents/carers recognise that educating children is a process that involves partnership between home and school and understand the importance of a good working relationship to equip children with the necessary skills for adulthood.

For these reasons we welcome and encourage parents/carers to participate fully in the life of the school, through avenues such as parent forums and the FPTA/PFCS.

The purpose of this code is to provide a reminder to all parents, carer and visitors about expected conduct to ensure a safe and positive school environment for our children.

Respect and Concern for others and their rights

Parents and carers are allowed on to school premises by permission of the school; this may be withdrawn if necessary.

We expect parents, carers and visitors to show respect and consideration for others by:

- Supporting the school ethos by setting a good example in their speech and behaviour towards all members of the school community both on and off the school premises;
- Being conscious of other parents/ children when talking on or off school premises so not to offend in any way;

- Allowing plenty of time so that children arrive ready for a punctual start of the school day, to avoid disruption to their learning and that of others;
- Respecting the school environment, including keeping the school tidy by not littering;
- Parking carefully and in good time for the safety of the children, yourself and other road users, and not parking, waiting or stopping in no-parking areas.
- Not bringing animals onto the school grounds for health and safety reasons, unless for educational purposes and with the prior permission of the school.

In order to support the ethos of the school, we will not tolerate:

Using loud and/or offensive language or displaying temper;

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- Threatening, aggressive or intimidating conversations or behaviour towards another adult or child.
- Abusive, threatening or damaging emails, phone, text or social network messages relating to the schools;
- Using tobacco, or being under the influence of alcohol or drugs on the school premises;
- Damaging or destroying school property;
- Disruptive behaviour which interferes with teaching, learning or administration of the school.

The Executive Headteacher and Federation Governors may prohibit an adult from entering the school grounds to safeguard our school community. Adverse behaviour may be reported to the appropriate authorities.

Review

The governors review this policy every two years. The Governors may however review the policy earlier than this if the government introduces new regulations or if the Governing Body receives recommendations on how the policy could be improved.


