
Travel to Malawi



Hector, your dragon cake looks amazing! Almost too good to eat! If there is ever an opportunity for you to compete in Bake Off, you should go for it!










HOME LEARNING

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Scarlett from Squirrel Class has been learning all about a writer called Samuel Pepys as a part of her Great Fire of London topic.


Scarlett has written her own diary AND has even tea-stained her paper to make it look like it came from the era she has been learning about!

He created a rainbow out of lego!


Nice one, Jake, now you can have a permanent rainbow brightening up your home!

Our Challenge 'Travel from East Hoathly to Malawi' the distance of 6555 Miles

What do you need to do?

Walk, jog, cycle or scoot, as part of your outside exercise each day and keep track of your distance.

Every person who 'travels' can count their distance, so if 3 family members walk for 3 miles that would be 9 miles towards the journey.

At the end of the week fill your distance log sheet and email it to traveltomalawi@pioneerfederation.co.uk Miss Denney (East Hoathly) who will then be combining all the distances together and giving us weekly updates. Feel free to also send in photos of your 'travels' so we can share them with our community.

All children, parents and staff are encouraged to take part!

Is this doable?

Of course! If 100 members of our four school community take part each member would need to do roughly an average of 13 miles per week across the 5 weeks until the end of February half term.
