
Reading



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



News from Foxes Class



News from Owls Class



Owls have been busy using their scientific observational skills to prove that light travels in straight lines. In Geography, we have started our new unit all about the continent of Europe, and our English lessons have had us thinking about 'Remembrance' through our flashback film narratives. Swimming lessons began last week and we look forward to a few weeks at Bede's, building on and perfecting our water skills.













Hedgehogs Forest School - Wednesday 1st November 2023

Hedgehogs did really well, making sure that they had all the right waterproof gear on for a potentially soggy Forest School. We made our way out to the playground to do some conker rolling, taking it in turns to see how far we could roll our conker.

We had a game of 'keep of the keys'. Taking it in turns to sneak in, steal the keys and run as fast as possible back to our seat without being caught. With a wet floor this was a very slippy game.

Some children helped to put up the slack line, working really well as a team and listening very well to instructions. There was then some great balancing, not so easy in wet wellies. Others in the class remembered their den building skills from the previous session and worked hard to create another den. They used parts of the trim trail to peg to, however when the wind blew it managed to pop all the pegs off. Hedgehogs were straight on it with repairs to their den.

There were some beautiful rubbing pictures created using leaves. The leaves were placed under a piece of paper and a crayon was then rubbed over the top leaving an outline of the leaf.

We finished the session with a woodland whisper that got a little muddled along the way. Then listened to what they had enjoyed about their morning at Forest School.

Squirrels Forest School - Wednesday 8th November 2023

As a class we looked at a selection of tree seeds, seeing if we could identify them. Squirrels class were very good at this, knowing what most of them were. We walked about that they need to grow. Some on the acorns we looked at had started sprouting. Squirrels then set off for a soggy adventure in the woods.

On the way to the woods the children pointed out how wet and muddy it was. As we walked we looked for animal tracks. Lots of boot prints were found and one animal track, "it's a dog foot".

Once in the woods the children were really keen to get started. Some of them worked as a team to build shelters using sticks, balancing them against a tree. They worked well helping each other to move the sticks that were too big for one person to move alone. Others put up tarpaulin shelters to try and keep dry.

We took the tree seeds with us to the woods; we had conkers, acorns and sweet chestnuts. The children float tested the conkers to see what ones were good to plant, the ones that sank were good to plant and those that floated were no good. They then planted many seeds and some daffodil bulbs in pots to take back to school to watch them grow. There were lots of muddy hands after the planting so we used the water that was running down the big beech trees like a waterfall to wash our hands.

A group of children found a fallen tree with a whole in, they gathered lots of natural materials and created a potion.

With the conkers squirrels used a palm drill to make a hole in the conker. They then threaded them onto pipe cleaner to create a conker caterpillar.













What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

SNOPCHAT

Snapchat is an instant messaging app which allows users to send images, videos and texts to people in their friends list. One of Snapchat's unique features is that pictures and messages 'disappear' 24 hours after they've been viewed; however, this content isn't as temporary as many believe – with some users saving screenshots or using another device to take a photo of their screen. This year, Snapchat added 'My Al': a customisable chatbot with which people can chat and share secrets, as well as asking for advice and suggestions of places to visit.



WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

Even if your child only connects with people they know, they may still get riend requests from strangers. The Quick Add option lets users befriend people the app recommends – but these 'friends' are merely a username, which could have anyone behind it. Accepting such requests reveals children's personal information through the Story, SnapMap and Spotlight features, potentially putting them at risk from predators.

EXCESSIVE USE

Snapchat works hard on user engagement, with features like streaks (messaging the same person every day to build up a high score). Spotlight Challenges tempt users into spending time producing content in search of cash prizes and online fame, while it's easy for children to pass hours watching Spotlight's endless scroll of videos.

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Some videos and posts on Snapchat aren't suitable for children. The hashtags used to group content are determined by the poster, so even an innocent search term could still yield age-inappropriate results. The app's 'disappearing messages' feature also makes it easy for young people (teens in particular) to share explicit images on impulse – so sexting continues to be a risk associated with Snapchat.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

My Al is Snapchat's new chatbot, which replies to questions in a human-like manner. However, the software is still in its infancy and has significant drawbacks, such as biased, incorrect or misleading responses. There have already been numerous reports of young users turning to Al for medical help and diagnoses, which could be inaccurate and therefore potentially dangerous.

OF RESTRICTION

ONLINE PRESSURES

Although many of Snapchat's filters are designed to entertain or amuse, the 'beautify' effects on photos can set unrealistic body-image expectations - creating feelings of inadequacy if a young person compares themselves unfavourably with other users. Snapchat now also has 'priority' notifications (which still get displayed even if a device is in 'do not disturb' mode), increasing the pressure on users to log back in and interact.

VISIBLE LOCATION

Snap Map highlights a device's exact position on a virtual map which is visible to other users. There are options to restrict who can see this information: all friends, only you (Ghost Mode) or selected friends. Snapchat also has real-time location sharing, which is intended as a buddy system to ensure friends have reached home safely – but which could also be used to track a young person for more sinister reasons.

Advice for Parents & Carers

#NOFILTER

Add ME

TURN OFF QUICK ADD

The Quick Add feature helps people find each other on the app. This function works based on mutual friends or whether someone's number is in your child's contacts list. Explain to your child that this could potentially make their profile visible to strangers. We recommend that your child turns off Quick Add, which can be done in the settings (accessed via the cog icon).

CHOOSE GOOD CONNECTIONS

In 2021, Snapchat rolled out a new safety feature: users can now receive notifications reminding them of the importance of maintaining connections with people they actually know well, as opposed to strangers. This 'Friend Check Up' encourages users to delete connections with users that they rarely communicate with, to maintain their online safety and privacy.

KEEP ACCOUNTS PRIVATE

Profiles are private by default, but children may make them public to gain more followers. Snap Stories are visible to everyone your child adds, unless they change the settings. On SnapMaps, their location is visible unless Ghost Mode is enabled (again via settings). It's safest not to add people your child doesn't know in real life – especially since the addition of My Places, which allows other Snapchat users to see where your child regularly visits and checks in.

DISCUSS AI

Although My Al's responses can often give the impression that it's a real person, it's essential that young people remember this certainly isn't the case. Encourage your child to think critically about My Al's replies to their questions: are they accurate and reliable? Remind them that My Al shouldn't replace chatting with their real friends, and that it's always better to talk to an actual person in relation to medical matters.

CHAT ABOUT CONTENT

It may feel like an awkward conversation (and one that young people can be reluctant to have) but it's important to talk openly and non-judgementally about sexting. Remind your child that once something's online, the creator loses control over where it ends up and who else sees it. Likewise, it's vital that children understand that some challenges which become popular on the platform may have potentially harmful consequences.

Meet Our Expert

Dr Cleire Sutherland is an online safety consultant, aducator and researcher who has developed and implemented anti-bullying and cyber safety policies for schools. She has written various academic papers and carried out research for the Australian government comparing internet use and sexting behaviour of young people in the UK, USA and Australia.



BE READY TO BLOCK AND REPORT

If a stranger does connect with your child on Snapchat and begins to make them feel uncomfortable through bullying, pressure to send explicit images or by sending sexual images to them, your child can select the three dots on that person's profile and report or block them. There are options to state why they're reporting that user (annoying or malicious messages, spam, or masquerading as someone else, for example).




