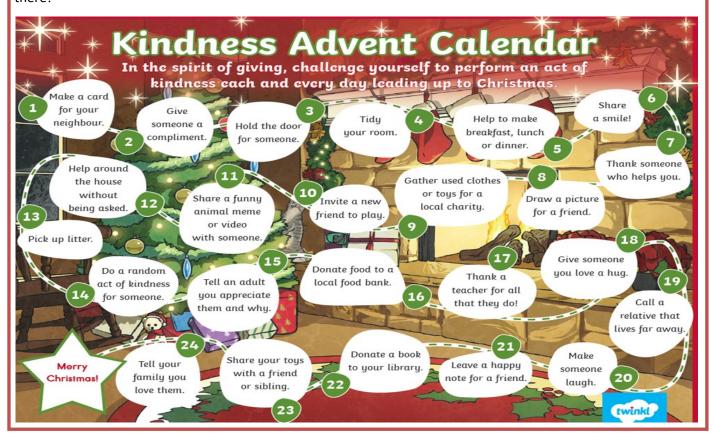
Dear Park Mead Families,

Attendance

Children need to attend school regularly to enable them to benefit from their education.

Missing out on lessons leaves children vulnerable to falling behind, both academically and socially which impacts on their emotional wellbeing and creates further barriers to learning.

It's amazing how quickly frequent absence from school can add up to a considerable amount of lost learning for your child. For instance, over a year:

- 1. 95% Attendance = 9 days absent—approximately 2 weeks of school = 50 lessons missed
- 2. 90% Attendance = 19 days absent—approximately 4 weeks of school = 100 lessons missed
- 3. 85% Attendance = 29 days absent—approximately 6 weeks of school = 150 lessons missed
- 4. 80% Attendance = 38 days absent—approximately 8 weeks of school = 200 lessons missed

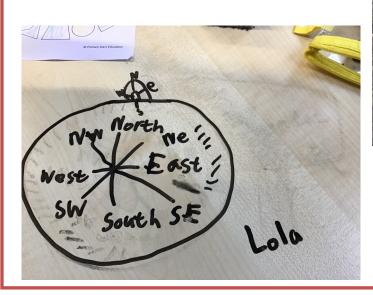




News from Chestnuts

They experienced using slates, ink pens, wrote a postcard home and made a pom-pom (Christmas tree decoration). They tried their hand at sewing on hessian and even had the opportunity to look around the Tudor parts of the house.

They had a lovely time- even if it did pour with rain! It was a great experience and they looked the part!



Holy Trinity Church eco-garden project in collaboration with Park Mead Primary School

Holy Trinity Church, members of the congregation and community of Upper Dicker village, and Bedes school are working on an exciting environmental project in the heart of the village to transform the churchyard into an **eco-garden** to increase biodiversity, and provide a sanctuary for wildlife.





The churchyard is being re-wilded so that it can become a wildflower meadow in the heart of the village with a meander mown through it for all members of the community to enjoy.

There will be planting of fruit and nut bearing trees for beauty, to encourage birds, bats and pollinators, and to provide free forage for visitors to the church.

There will be managed areas for small mammals, invertebrates and other wildlife to make their homes in.

There will also be areas for quiet contemplation with seating and beautiful scented plants.

This project is for the benefit of all the community and the work will be carried out on a voluntary basis at certain times of the year. The church is a wonderful community asset and such a project will have benefits for all.

We would be very excited to involve Park Mead School in this project. The church is within walking distance of the school and provides a safe and unique learning environment in which many aspects of the school curriculum could be addressed. It could be a wonderful place for extended quiet study, a space where parents could get involved too, and the children will feel pride in helping to make one of the most prominent buildings in the village a haven for nature.

Park Mead are holding an assembly early in term 3 to launch this project with the children.

We are also in further discussion with Park Mead School to see how the church eco-garden project could be woven into the school curriculum as a resource that is right on the school's doorstep.

Maples Forest School

Wednesday 15th November 2023

Once Maples were ready we headed out onto the playground for a game of Keeper of the Keys. In this game, the children have to sneak in, take the keys and run back to their seat before the keeper catches them.

Once we were at the Forest School site, a group of children helped to lay the fire. To get the fire going, they used the fire lighting skills they had learnt from their previous session. The kettle was placed over the fire to boil ready for hot chocolate. Maples then took it in turns to toast a marshmallow, which was put between two biscuits ready for eating - "it's so gooey".

The impact of Forest School for the children is the knowledge the children have gained from the Forest School experience.

The impact can be seen through the skills gained, tools used, art and craft activities, observations and knowledge of the fruit, plants and trees in relation to the seasons and the skills involved in learning how to play Forest School games.

The hammock was put up as a swing and the class took it in turns to climb inside and push each other. There was some great team work when rebuilding the den in the corner of Forest School. The children worked together to push wood through the fence to create a roof.

With all the rain we have had there was a rather large puddle that needed to be explored. The class waded through it, splashed in it and also got stuck in it!

We finished the session with a woodland whisper; it got a little muddled so I think we may need to try this again.

Oaks Forest School

Wednesday 22nd November 2023

Oaks started Forest School today with moving some fencing material down to our site. They worked in pairs to carry each rail as they were a little too long and heavy to carry alone.

A few children practised the fire lighting skills they had learnt in their previous sessions; they are defiantly getting faster at producing the spark that lights the cotton wool. Once the fire was established the kettle was filled and hung over the fire to boil. Oaks then took it in turns to sit by the fire and toast a marshmallow, this was then placed between two biscuits ready for eating - "so yummy". The kettle soon boiled and everyone enjoyed a warm hot chocolate to go with the s'mores.

The Impact of Forest School for the children is the knowledge the children have gained from the Forest School experience.

The impact can be seen through the skills gained, tools used, art and craft activities, observations and knowledge of the fruit, plants trees in relation to the seasons and the skills involved in learning how to play Forest School games.

Some of the class spent time removing the mud from the daily mile track. They did this by using shovels and brooms to scrape and then sweep as much of the mud away as they could. A channel was dug so that the water could run away. This became so muddy that a couple of the class lost their wellies in the channel, these had to be dug out to get them back!

Some of the children used palm drills to make a hole in a disc of wood, this was quite tricky as the wood was very seasoned but the children persevered until they had made it all the way through. They then used pens to decorate their disk, some as Christmas decorations; one was a picture of a Christmas tree - "a Christmas tree to hang on my Christmas tree". Others were decorated with nature pictures with the children adding a piece of string so that they could be hung up.



Mental Health Workshops

Sussex Partnership NHS Foundation Trust have organised a programme of workshops which are open to all parents and carers of young people in Sussex.

The mental health workshops, all led by experienced CAMHS clinicians, will take place virtually. Each webinar will be available twice a day, once during the day (10am) and once in the evening (7pm) to make it as easy as possible for people to attend.

17 th January 2024	Obsessive Compulsive Disorder (OCD)

Parents and carers will have the choice of which workshop to attend, with recordings of any others being made available afterwards.

The sessions last for 90-120 minutes with the opportunity to ask any questions to CAMHS clinicians. Due to anticipated high numbers of attendees, any questions will need to be sent

in advance.
