

Pupils as Leaders



At St Mary's, key pupil roles are created to ensure that our students are making a highly-positive, tangible contribution to the life of the school and the wider community. Meaningful opportunities are developed and embedded for pupils to understand how to be responsible and respectful active citizens who contribute positively to society.

House Captains

The role of House Captains is one of privilege, pride and responsibility. House Captains are elected by the rest of the pupils in their house, after they've given a speech about what they can offer. The House Captains lead and support the children in their House in a variety of sporting competitions; collect, monitor and announce House Points each week; are excellent role models in behaviour and attitude; help organise their houses when we have off-timetable days and motivate and inspire the pupils in their Houses.



Pupil Ambassadors

Pupil Ambassadors have an important role to play at St Mary's. They were selected to be Ambassadors, after writing a letter of application, because they are recognised as inspiring role-models of respectful behaviour, learning attitude and active contribution to the school and wider community. They show visitors around the school; participate in Open Mornings and help out with other extra-curricular events. Pupils are made aware of the responsibility that accompanies this role and the high standards of behaviour that all Ambassadors must adhere to.

Eco-Committee

Our Eco-Committee is made up of children who are passionate about making our school more sustainable and helping us become more aware of green issues. The Committee is run by one of our Associate Governors, Hilary Rowberry and her husband, Mr Rowberry. The children are the driving force behind the Committee, which meets every Wednesday, to discuss new ideas and plan activities aimed at increasing environmental awareness. The Eco-Committee has introduced a number of initiatives ranging from posting signs reminding us to turn off lights to holding regular 'Big



Cleans', where they go out into the wider community litter-picking.



Pupil Governors

KS1 & KS2 classes have elected two children to be their representatives as Pupil Governors. The Pupil Governors meet regularly to discuss suggestions put forward by their respective classes. They are the voice of the pupils and are expected to be good role models and ambassadors for the school. The Pupil Governors are also our Anti-Bullying Ambassadors and Love, Strength and Faith Champions

MAPLE CLASS BUDDY TIME

The impact of Buddy Time is for the children to build their confidence, create personal and social relationships and to support them through their first year at School.

This impact can be seen through the skills learned, the activities we do, and the observations and discussions that the children have with each other.

At St Mary's, Maple Class and their Year 6 Buddies have half an hour together every Tuesday afternoon.



This week, Maple shared their 'All About Me' books, which they made in the summer. They talked about things that they liked, places they have been and asked questions about each other.



So far this term, the children have made collages of themselves, learning how to use scissors and glue independently, whilst talking about how special they are.



They have also been on a number hunt around the school, where they spotted numbers in classrooms and the outdoor environment. This was also a chance to become more familiar with the school building, with support from their knowledgeable Buddies.




Positivity Board

share. In the newsletter every week, there will be a picture to share and celebrate the positivity within our school and community.



School Development Plan

Mr Procter explained what the school's aims are for the year and rationale for having a School Development Plan (full copy available on the website).

It is split into the 5 sections of the new Ofsted Framework and the overview of each section is as follows:

Quality of Education:

Developing our new curriculum

Aiming to improve the subject knowledge for teachers

Ensuring strong outcomes for end of KS results.

A focus on reading at KS1 and having consistent progress scores for KS2.

Defining our teaching vision and values through teaching and learning policy

Following the national initiative to reduce teacher workload

Ensuring expertise in subjects is shared across the federation

Governors to challenge and support schools.

Behaviour and Attitudes

Pupils as Leaders is a big focus and ensuring they make a huge difference to the life of the school and wider community – we want our pupils to know how they contribute to the school

Attendance staying above national

Anti-bullying award being led by Miss Banks and a working party of children, parents and governors.

Personal Development

6x special day events to ensure that the curriculum is enriched

Sports events

Learning powers and 6Bs and the impact that they are going to have on children's learning.

Early Years Foundation Stage

Separate area under new Ofsted expectations.

EYFS teachers lead strong hub across the county to help CPD for all Early Years practitioners

Curriculum

There are new expectations on how schools should run their curriculum – we need to consider the '3 Is'. This is bespoke to the Federation and has considered the 'cultural capital' of the trips of the children. The curriculum is clear and consistent between all teachers and documented in a way that makes it clear as to the aims of the education at Pioneer schools.

3 Is

Intent – defining the sequence of topics – schools choose the topics ensuring they cover the National Curriculum

Implementation – what are the skills that children will learn?

Impact – what difference is it making to children's knowledge?

Yellow highlighted key on each curriculum event on the website to make it really clear why we are running particular trips or events and what was the knowledge that children gained.

Curriculum is a 2-year cycle (currently on cycle 2) and details each year group's curriculum and broken down into the 3 l's for clarity.

This is always adapting and being evaluated so any feedback on what the children are learning and talking about would be really welcomed.

Homework

Miss Hare went through the policy which is available on the website and details each class' expectations. A reminder about KS2 practising their times tables weekly will be added to KS2's homework 'checklist'. Best way to practise these is through Timestable Rockstars or on PurpleMash.

Teacher-led clubs

Times-tables teaching/practising

In Year 3 and 4, time-stables are taught at least 3 times a week (similar to spellings).

Regular practise is also needed at home to ensure consolidation of school learning.

Year 4 children will take part in a national test for their times-tables in June of each school year.
