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Global Handwashing Day

On Thursday, each class paused to celebrate Global Handwashing Day, which is now perhaps more prevalent than ever! We linked up with Starfish Malawi to explore how important it is that all people across the world have access to clean water and sanitation. We learnt how 1 in 3 people in Malawi

don't have access to clean water (that's 5.8 million people!) and so Starfish Malawi have been providing wash stands, which include clean water and soap, that operate by putting your foot onto a pedal.

Some of Lilac Class were so inspired by this that they actually had a go at making their own washstand at Forest School!

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Starfish Malawi is a Christian charity that works to support schools and other much needed projects in Malawi. St Mary's has been associated with the charity for a number of years and we are twinned with a school in Kajenderee. We will be sharing regular updates with you about the work of the Charity! This week we have discovered that whilst we are going into Winter in England, temperatures in Malawi are

regularly reaching a massive 31 degrees!

There has been a recent fund raising walk at Bewl Water, where £9,200 was raised which will go towards providing:

- Over 100,000 meals per year for children with insufficient to eat
- Running 4 nurseries with places for over 500 children
- Much needed medication at a new Health Clinic

All of the work is undertaken to show that as human beings, we can give generously to those who through no fault of their own, have so little.

Children in Malawi have been undertaking a phased return to school since the beginning of September and classes are being staggered as size has been limited to 40! Children over 10 years of age have to wear a face mask and sports activities and clubs are prohibited.

We are reminded that Malawi needs ongoing support and prayer as they navigate these uncertain times.

Willow Class - Forest School Thursday 8th October 2020

The Impact of Forest School for the children is the knowledge the they gain from the Forest School experience.



It can be seen through their skills, using tools, the art and craft activities, the observations made and knowledge



fruit, plants and trees in relation to the seasons and in the skills involved in learning how to play Forest School games.







This week, the children learned that fungi can be extremely poisonous, but also vital to the health of the woodland. They identified fungi and learned to recognise a fly agaric, which stood out boldly against the woodland floor.

Then, it was onto creating, making, building and exploring with their friends. The children's confidence in their own ideas has grown and they all independently set

Some learned to use palm drills to drill holes in conkers and to thread and tie knots with string. Some sculpted brilliant creations with clay. There was excellent team work with transporting logs and branches to develop their dens and there was of course,

swinging and climbing.







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Wellbeing Day

On Wednesday, we all paused our usual timetables to have a whole-school Wellbeing Day! Each class took part in four different activities across the day. We learnt First Aid: from what to do when someone is choking to what we can do if someone bangs their head. We explored Healthy Eating and what it means to have a balanced diet, learning about the different food groups. A vote was held on the least favourite vegetable (quite a heated topic as I'm sure you can imagine) before watching some fun recipe ideas based on these vegetables. Our next topic was Mental Health and how diversity and differences can affect how people see themselves. We spoke about how we should be accepting



and including of all people and show interest in learning about different cultures as we would never want others to feel left out for just being who they are!



Lastly, we played some Wellbeing and Mindfulness games, exploring how compliments can make us feel and thinking about all the things we should be grateful for, even in these tricky times. On top of all these amazing activities, time was spent outside in nature by all the children and lunch was covered so that the staff had a well-deserved longer lunch break. Days like this are always fun and inspiring; the children are always so reflective and really understand the importance of Wellbeing for all.

IMPACT & KNOWLEDGE GAINED: The children learnt some basic First Aid and are now able to talk about the importance of helping others. They can now talk about having a balanced diet and how this impacts on their wellbeing as well as their physical health. We explored diversity and mental health which allowed the children to learn about different cultures and how we should be inclusive towards all people.

Parent Forum

The Parent Forum was held on Monday 5th October where Mrs King and Mrs Boldero gave information on our updated PSHE Policy and approach.

Undertaking a School Health Profile told us what the children wanted to learn more about and using current guidance alongside the wonderful Jigsaw programme, our Policy based around the school values of Love, Strength and Faith has been embedded into the school curriculum.

There are six identified aspects to the programme:

- Being Me in My World
- Celebrating Difference
- Dreams and Goals
- Healthy Me
- Relationships
- Changing Me



Each theme is taught across the school, covering aspects relevant to the age of the children.

Our Learning Powers link nicely alongside the program as being brave and curious, using skills of concentration and perseverance all help us to grow into well-rounded healthy, independent and confident individuals.

Much time has been (and is) given to the coordination of this programme which uses a spiral system to ensure all children have covered everything at their own level across the school.


Volunteers
