The Impact of Forest School for the children is the knowledge the children have gained from the Forest School experience.


Today the wind blew up a storm, so we stayed on the village croft to avoid any possible falling branches. We have been thinking about SPRING in class, learning songs about SPRING and drawing pictures on the school grounds. So the children set off in search of some more signs of SPRING in the village.





The children explored the old oak tree and used fallen sticks to tap our rhythms and patterns on its trunk.

The IMPACT of Forest School can be seen through the skills involved in learning how to play Forest School games, physical challenges, tools used, art and craft activities, observations and the knowledge of the fruit, plants trees in relation to the seasons.







The flowers we identified today were daffodils, celandines, primroses, crocuses and cherry blossom on the tree.

Some of the trees had little pools of water in them, which the children thought would be great bird baths and bird drinking places.


A massive thanks to our volunteers who supported the children with all of their exploring and learning. We can't wait until next time!

#### Hope Clinic

Starfish Malawi have continued to develop the Glad Tidings project in the community at Ngolowindo and now have quality healthcare facilities to help those in the community.

The clinic is living by its name to give hope to the communities that struggled before to access healthcare nearby to their villages. Through word of mouth, many others have been able to come from further distances. In those areas, there are health centres, but the people opt to come to Hope clinic for a number or reasons. Firstly, because the healthcare, treatments and drugs are free, a guaranteed supply of drugs are available and the communities know that Dr Dora and her team maintain high standards of care.

Recently the Government Health Department carried out a survey of the healthcare provision in the Salima area and we are delighted that Hope Clinic came 3<sup>rd</sup> overall. This is remarkable bearing in mind it only opened in September last year and has seen 11,179 patients since its inception!
