

Wildlife Explorers

St Mary's Wildlife Explorer Club celebrated Spring this week by investigating flowers. They discovered that flowers attract pollinators by colour, scent and nectar. Pollen comes from the male stamens and is carried to the female stigma to make seeds. When they had dissected their Tulips, the Explorers set up a display so that everyone could see the parts they had observed.

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Cherry Class Wakehurst Place

This term Cherry Class' topic is 'Glorious Growing'. To <u>immerse ourselves</u> in all things botanical, yesterday we headed off to Wakehurst Place. Since we started this topic (last week!) Cherry Class have been particularly

fascinated about seeds. Convenient then, that Wakehurst is home to the Milenium Seed Bank.

On arrival, we were led down through the Gardens to the Mansion House. Once inside, we were shown an image of a birthday party with lots of different food including popcorn, chocolate, cake, juice, and bread. We learnt that without plants we wouldn't have any of these foods.

The next part of the day was the **Amazing Seeds workshop**. We got to see the largest seed in the world: the double coconut. It was huge! We compared it with the smallest seed in the world: the seed from an orchid. It was really hard to see. We then had the opportunity to engage with 4 different activities to discover seeds more closely. The children loved



the opportunity to use microscopes to get a really close look at a variety of seeds.

We then embarked on the **Tremendous Trees Trail** discovering trees that live in the rainforest, trees as old as Dinosaurs (we learnt diplodocuses ate them!),

trees whose seeds need wings to help them disperse and the thickest beech tree we have ever seen.

Once we had eaten lunch and had a well-deserved run and play on the mansion lawns, we had a go at some **Ephemeral Art**.; using natural objects collected from the ground to create images of plants. The children were fantastic at working together to create some really beautiful pictures.

The impact of this trip can be shown through the knowledge gained through direct interaction with seeds and plants. The opportunity to compare a huge variety of seeds has given the children a strong foundation at the start of our learning into how plants grow and develop.



On our return to the classroom, as we continue to grow plants and develop our knowledge of plants, we will look at seeds with a new sense of awe and wonder.

Every Friday morning we have our virtual Celebration assembly as a whole school! It's a brilliant opportunity to see the whole school together and lovely to see the children waving to their friends in other classes. 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Well Being Poster

This week's well being poster comes from VegPower whose on-going mission is to encourage the UK to eat more vegetables. They report that recent research from Leeds University found that only one in five children have any vegetables or salad in their packed lunches and would like to make it easier for parents and carers to add more veg by giving a few ideas.



1. The Salad-on-a-Stick

Get a bamboo kebab stick and thread on different veg such as cherry tomatoes, cubed cucumber, cubed cooked beetroot, chunks of peppers, raw button mushrooms, crunchy lettuce, etc) in fun colours. If your child isn't a fan of veg, try starting off by alternating veg with cooked meat, cubed cheese, etc to ease them into it.

2. The Lunch Crunch 📕

1 carrot chopped into sticks (or pre-chopped carrot sticks) with a pot of hummus (or their favourite dip) adds a portion of veg.

3. The Sandwich Slice

Slice 5cm cucumber (about the length of a small egg) and add to a sandwich for an extra portion of veg with minimal effort.

4. The Helpful Handful

Add a handful of ready-to-eat snacky veg to a container. Try cherry tomatoes, drained tinned sweetcorn, celery sticks, green beans, cucumber etc.

5. The Half-Baked Plan



Heat through half a tin of **baked beans** (ideally low sugar and salt) and stick in a heat-retaining flask for an easy veg portion win.

Top tip: Keep trying! If they are not used to veg in their packed lunch, it may be picked out and ignored on the first few days. The more they see it and interact with it, the more the veg becomes "normal".
