



Wildlife Explorers

The Wildlife Explorers found out about an amazing animal called Wally the Walrus this week. A walrus who should have stayed near the North Pole drifted to England, France and Wales before swimming back to colder seas. He swam thousands of miles and clambered onto several boats to have rest up on the way — much to the astonishment of the owners!





We also did some great science by investigating what invertebrate mini-beasts are beneath our feet.

To do this, we dug out squares of turf and counted all the earthworms and mini-beasts we could see. The results will help to find out if there is enough food for many of our wild birds. Some of the earthworms in the grass in front of our school were 20 centimetres long!

Forest School: Cherry Class, Thursday 23rd September

The Impact of Forest School is the knowledge the children gain from the Forest School experience which can be seen through the skills developed, tools used, art and craft activities undertaken, their observations and knowledge of the fruit, plants and trees in relation to the seasons, and the skills involved in learning how to play Forest School games.

This week the plants we saw were blackberries. The children collected as many as they could find and had fun noticing the different types of berries, hawthorn and rose hips. Once they got to the woods, some children made paint with the berries and painted some lovely pictures! The whole class were great British Citizens, using litter pickers to collect any rubbish from the hedges and edges as they walked to the woods. Well done Cherry Class!



They played a game of 'Spirit of the Forest', where they first pretended to be small wild foxes, blackbirds and owls. They had to run from one side to the other without getting caught and turned into a tree! Some children were excellent at this!

Mrs Fry brought her lovely puppy Rupert to the woods this week. Cherry Class were really good a

taking it in turns in holding his lead and playing with him on the walk to the woods.



Some children caught a glimpse of some deer crossing the track!

Once we were in the woods, the children were great at tapping sticks in time and following rhythm and movement patterns. Their creative sides emerged during their free exploration time, exploring the ropes and bridges, hammocks and swings.





Wellbeing Day

On Tuesday 28th September, Martin from Open View came to school and ran sessions with each class looking

at different aspects of Wellbeing and how to care for ourselves and each other. There was much role play involved encouraging the children to be assertive and let others know if they are feeling sad or worried, with Martin feeding back on what excellent actors we have in school.



Every class showed great interest and compassion as they were led through a variety of situations which encouraged practical ways to maintain and improve our own Mental Health, then looked at ways in which we can all support friends.



The Classes were kept busy undertaking some physical activity to encourage physical wellbeing and the younger classes entertained through a mixture of puppetry.



Mind Full, or Mindful?

Each session finished with an activity of mindfulness.

Martin was impressed with how the children spoke and worked with each other as well a

worked with each other as well as the quality of ideas that the children shared.

It was a very helpful and productive day.



Stranger Awareness

On Friday 1st October two Police Officers came to visit the school.

They met with Reception, Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 separately and spoke with both about helping people in the community and keeping people safe. They also talked with the children about who to ask if you are lost or meet a stranger and who to talk to about it.



The children asked lots of questions which including finding out about the job of a Police Officer.












Positivity Board

School governing boards have three core functions as set out by the Department of Education:


- "Ensuring clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction;
- holding Executive leaders to account for the educational performance of the organisation and its pupils, and the effective and efficient performance management of staff, and
- overseeing the financial performance of the organisation and making sure its money is well spent."

The Pioneer Governing Board has 13 governors and 3 associate members (invited onto the Board to help in specific areas), who will be working in a strategic role with the Senior Leadership Team to ensure that the pupils across our 4 amazing schools have the best possible education.



We are very thankful for the Governors we have as they come with a wealth of experience and have an extensive range of expertise, including four previous Headteachers, a secondary school assistant Headteacher, Chairs of other governing boards and two members who work within the Diocese.

We have an elected Chair of Governors (Alan Brundle) and four vice chairs who will each form a special link with one school, visiting regularly and feeding back to the full governing board.



Each Governor is linked with one Pioneer Teacher Subject Lead, who they will work with to ensure a rich and broad curriculum is in place for all pupils at our schools.

Within the next Newsletters, there will be an introduction to each of your governors, including which school and subject they are linked with, and any other roles they are undertaking.

There has been one meeting so far this year and all of the new board members are looking forward to working with the school communities to help them be the best they can be for all our wonderful Pioneer pupils.

Safeguarding	The school has g 'it could happen here' approach and recognise that
	safeguarding is the whole team's responsibility.
	Miss Hare is the Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) for the school with Mr
	Procter and Miss Surtees as the deputies (DDSL).
	All concerns must be reported verbally to them and then a written account
	provided with as much detail and use of child's own words quoted as possible.
	If a child discloses something to a volunteer that they feel is 'uncomfortable', in
	the first instance they will speak with the class teacher. This is likely to then be
	referred to Miss Hare or one of the DDSLs.
	When dealing with a disclosure, volunteers must not ask leading questions but
	can ask for more information with questions such as 'could you tell me a bit
	more about that?' When dealing with a disclosure, the child must never be
	promised that what they have said will be kept a secret, even if they ask you to.
GDPR	Issues relating to Confidentiality and GDPR were shared and explained.
	Everyone in school is bound by these rules and must not share personal
	information about a child, parent or member of staff that is learnt within
	school.
	Personal information relates to everything about a person that you would not
	know by looking at them. It also applies to school work and media images.
	To share information equates to a Data Breach which is investigated by our
	Data Protection Officer.
Reading	The 5 Reading Strategies were shared and explained.
	Miss Hare explained that when writing a comment about a child's reading, aim
	to be specific about strategies used, page numbers read and any vocabulary
	they learnt or discussed so the next adult reading with a child can pick this up
	the next time.
Writing	The '5 Finger Tips for Good Writing' were shared and explained.
	Volunteers are encouraged to use this if working on a written task with a child
	to ensure the basics of writing are embedded.
6 <u>B</u> <u>s</u>	The 6 Bs were shared and explained.
	The importance of developing independent learners is key for all who work
	with children at St Mary's to help develop the skills they will need later in life.
Forest School	Those who have had experience of volunteering at forest school shared some
	top tips about going to forest school.

Well Being Poster

With Harvest Festival next week, this week's wellbeing poster looks at 7 Random Acts of Kindness Ideas for Children taken from Parents.com 2021.

Kindness is a superpower that children can choose everyday and instead of making it a 'rule', kindness can be encouraged by showing it as a superpower that makes a child and others feel good. Research shows that 'being kind boosts happiness and wellbeing' and that 'kindness leads to an increase in peer acceptance.'

The following Random Acts of Kindness may encourage your child to become more confident in their abilities to impact the world around them.



1. Share a Kind Note

This idea stresses the importance of positive words. Ask your child what kindness means to them and encourage them to use those words to write a pleasant note to someone special.

2. Demonstrate the Power of Encouragement

Take some colourful sticky notes and encourage your child to fill them with encouraging compliments like, 'you are awesome', 'you are a good friend,' 'you can do this,' for someone special. Add their name to the notes and hide them around the house for them to discover.

3. Pick Up Litter Together

Have a conversation about how everyone has the power to make the world more beautiful and with a mind to safety and hygiene, take some time litter picking. If there is no safe, hygienic way to achieve this, spend time encouraging 'no littering' to establish as a life long habit.

4. Find Someone to Thank

Kind words go a long way and there is never a bad time to express gratitude. Encourage your child to say thank you to a teacher, a shop assistant, someone who has displayed an act of kindness towards them. It can be fun to 'find' people to thank together.

5. Add Gratitude to Your Evening Routine

Discussing gratefulness can be an 'eye opening' experience or a child. If possible introduce a time each night to look at what has made them happy that day.


6. Play 'I Spy Kindness'


Kindness exists all around us, we just need to look for it. When out and about take the opportunity to point out acts of kindness visible in the world around you. The more acts of kindness your child witnesses, the more ideas they will have for spreading cheer of their own.

7. See Something, Do Something

Children pay more attention to those around them than sometimes thought. When an issue is raised, take the opportunity to answer questions and heighten awareness then do one small thing about it together as a family. i.e. donating clothes to a shelter or volunteering together.

Every act of kindness, no matter how small, makes a difference so help your child engage their kindness superpowers!
