



Headlines from the Head

Focus on Parent Feedback

This week I have been analysing and acting on the feedback shared by so many of you either through our paper 'Parent Questionnaire' or via the 'google form' link we sent out. Thank you so much to those who completed these for us.

It is always so beneficial for school staff to hear the 'parent perspective' to ensure we can continue to develop and grow the school to ensure we meet our vision statement of 'being the best we can be, in a thriving community', so that our children receive the best possible offer.

Below is the summary of the responses to the questions asked. It is wonderful to hear your glowing comments but we do take on board the areas we hear from you that we need to improve on.

My child is happy at this school.	100%
My child feels safe at this school.	100%
The school makes sure its pupils are well behaved.	94%
My child has been bullied and the school dealt with the bullying quickly and effectively.	88%
The school makes me aware of what my child will learn during the year.	100%

My child has SEND and the school gives them the support they need to succeed.	73%
The school has high expectations for my child.	93%
My child does well at this school.	93%
The school lets me know how my child is doing.	93%
There is a good range of subjects available to my child at this school.	100%
My child can take part in clubs and extra-curricular activities at school.	100%
The school supports my child's wider personal development.	100%
I would recommend this school to another parent.	93%

Parents shared that they see some of **our strengths as being**: 'community ties, very personal approach and care for the children, all staff knowing our children's names, the sense of being a family, brilliant teachers who are kind and caring, being fully supported no matter what, supporting the children's development in a holistic way as well as educationally'.

It was wonderful to hear from one parent that shared that we "value them [children] as people, not treating all children the same, but supporting each individual's needs" and another said that "the school feels like an extended family as it is warm and welcoming".

Parents shared that areas they would like to see improve were: "talking to parents more and keeping them informed, managing challenging behaviour from children who misbehave and disrupt others, challenging children more in their areas of strength". These are useful perspectives that have and will inform our plans moving forward.

Our **communication pathways** will be strengthened by our move to a new email system through 'Arbor' which allows for a more efficient system of emailing parents in groups/classes and as a whole school. We have also created a new direct email address for parents to be able to inform us of any absences by using attendance@hartfield.school. Staff continue to be on the playground everyday to meet parents and answer any questions. Furthermore, we have set up our CommuniTEA events, for parents to come into school regularly to talk about any topics or issues relevant to school life. The next one is due to take place on 16th January at 2pm after drop off and will focus on our federation wide behaviour policy and the schools approach to supporting children to follow the Golden Rules of being Ready, Respectful and Safe. We would welcome parents to come to this and be part of discussions about our approach and share parental voices.



Cherry Forest School

Thursday 21st November 2024

Cherry class set off to Forest School on a chilly afternoon on the hunt for as many different fallen leaves as they could find. Using ID sheets of different leaf shapes the children were able to work out what the

leaves they had found were and what trees they belonged to "I found a Hazel leaf".






Once in the woods some of the children chose to use the tins they had brought in to make a mini bug hotel. They did this by gathering small sticks, leaves and some moss. They then places their gathered materials into their tins making sure to pack it well so that it doesn't fall out. As a group we talked about how important it is to create somewhere dry and out of the cold for bugs to hide "I'm making mine for a woodlouse" was said by one child as the placed sticks into their tin.


The Impact of Forest School for the children is the knowledge the children have gained from the Forest School experience.

The impact can be seen through the skills gained, tools used, art and craft activities, observations and knowledge of the fruit, plants and trees in

relation to the seasons and the skills involved in learning how to play Forest School games.



To finish off Forest School Cheery class had brought with them the houses that they had made last term when they learn about the fire of London. The class chose to place their houses in rows with small gabs between the rows the same









Combined Forest School Years 3+4

Thursday 28th November 2024

Today all the year 3 and 4 children from 3 different schools met for a Forest School adventure in the woods. They set off making their way across grass fields covered in frost and then along the forest way where the children spotted some spider webs sparkling in the sunshine as they were also coated with a layer of frost.





Once we were in the woods, we started with a tour of Forest School area to learn the boundaries and look at some of the activities waiting for the children to try, we also went over some safety rules for Forest School. The children were



then divided into groups ready to set off to explore by themselves, all groups of children would then rotate round giving then all the opportunity to fire light and have s'mores, construct in the stream or have

free time to explore for them-

selves.



At the fire circle the children had the opportunity to help light the fire using a

flint and steel. They did this by scraping the flint and steel together to create a spark to light a piece of cotton wool, which would then be added to the fire in the centre of our fire circle. Quite a lot of the group found it a little tricky; however, they did not give up trying until they had managed to achieve that spark and light their cotton wool. It was great to see them encouraging each other to keep striking, and those that had already done it were giving advice to the children that were finding it a little trickier. The children watching would then cheer and clap when the person struggling finally lit the cotton wool!

With the fire now roaring away the children were able to come in a roast a marshmallow. Once it was looking nice and gooey and maybe a little charred around the edges the marshmallow was placed between two chocolate biscuits ready to be enjoyed.

There was a large lump of clay that the children could use to have a go at making some leaf prints by rolling over a leaf onto of some clay, then peeling it away to leave the impression of the leaf behind. However, the use of the clay went a very different way with the children creating some amazing things. We had mugs, a bowl with its own lid, a sheep and so much more. One child decided to recreate the stone picture she had on the group label: this was of many flat stone

stacked on top of each other. She made many different sized balls of clay then flattened then before stacking them on top of each other in size order biggest to smallest.

With all the rain we have had there was a good flow of water making its way down the ditch that runs through Forest School. The children enjoyed sliding down the muddy banks into the water that they then waded through, mixing up the mud the bottom of the ditch and turning the flowing water to a muddy brown colour.


